One of Kim's greatest and latest discoveries was about her great-grandparents. To begin, Kim wrote down what she already knew. Her g-grandfather died in Columbus, Ohio. She knew he was Catholic. Their surname was Debney and her mother always said that her dad was born in Poland (or on the way over here.) He was possibly born in Poznan, the main capital of Poland. Kim also had both her grandfather's and g-grandfather's obituaries.

Kim started her research with Google, a perfect place for all of us to begin. She decided to type in Poznan, Poland and found an interesting site named the Poznan Project. This site is transcribing the 19th century marriage records from the historic Greater Poland (then Prussian Province of Poznan) into a searchable online database. Kim entered the name of her g-grandparents and she learned that the database is divided into Catholic or Protestant records by color. Once she typed the names, her g-grandparents came to the top of the records! His surname was spelled Dębny on the actual documents. Her grandmother was always known as Mary, but when she married in Poland, she was Michalina. Kim learned the exact date her g-grandparents were married and the towns where her g-grandparents were from. They lived about 9 miles outside Poznan, and so the information originally passed down to her was correct!

Google is a great place to begin researching. Besides Google, there is Google Books. You never know what you might find there. Books can add all kinds of interesting stories about the family or the place they lived and what the times were like that they lived in.

This is the last year Kim can be Treasurer in our genealogy society. During her time in office, she has simplified the way we keep the records, so anyone that is interested in this job could easily do it. Sit a spell and check out our magazines.

The latest issue of the Family Tree Magazine in the Brownson Legacy Library has a plethora of useful articles. It can be found with other issues in the upper cabinet to the right of the main library cabinet in the Tech Room at the Community Center.

The cover story is on Heritage Travel and entails how to save money as you travel to the **locations** from which vour ancestors immigrated. It includes such facets of planning as a budget, public transportation, lodging, food. technology. free resources. and customs, networking, regulations health and safety. Another story talks about tour companies, if you do not wish to go it alone and want to travel with a company with a genealogical theme.

"On the Road Again" tells of research resources in different areas of the country, including such institutions as the Family Search Library in Salt Lake City, the Allen County Public Library Genealogy Center in Fort Wayne IN, and the National Archives in Washington DC, as well as others not as well known. In addition, a story on the National Archives system reports on the different regional locations of NARA repositories. You may be able to find what you need closer to home or online.

The "centerfold" is all about Ellis Island, the information available there, common myths, tips on research, and written and online resources about this famed entry port for immigrants. It also lists other points of entry through which your ancestors may have passed.

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LIBRARY/ FAMILY TREE MAGAZINE

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The two states featured in this issue are New Hampshire and North Dakota. Each story gives a brief history of the state, when different records began being kept, where to find those records, and a list of resources related to genealogy in both states.

The Sunflower Genealogy Library, which includes books, pamphlets, magazines, maps, DVDs, and CDs, covers a wide variety of genealogical topics and makes them available for research close to home. NEW FROM FAMILY SEARCH

FamilySearch has a new "full search" index to search for previous unindexed searches!

It uses AI technology to read written text. Currently it only includes US Land records and probate records and Mexico records.

Go to FamilySearch.org/labs.

Sign into FamilySearch for free.

Turn on the first box that is named "Expand your search with Full Text"

version.

I've tried it and had great luck finding land records that I didn't think were there.
