Following in his father's footsteps, a Naval Hero o WWI, and those of his ancestors back to the revolutionary war, in 1949 at age 18, Patrick Brownson decided to enlist in the US Navy. However, quotas were in place then and the Navy was full. Instead, he enlisted in the Marines for one year active and 7 years reserve duty.

Pat trained in San Diego, CA and ultimately assigned to Washington's Bremerton Naval Shipyard, Military Police Unit. At year's end, he was honorably discharged.
